
Dr. O'Connell also worked on developing and issuing IAOS Membership Certificates.



We also found out that Hurling is the fastest sport on foot...




Hurling players are bound to experience many collisions, so protective helmets with faceguards are mandatory.



United States and Ireland Connections

It is estimated that 40 million Americans are of Irish heritage. It is interesting to note that the United States and Ireland are both republics and are both countries that have fought a revolution to become independent. The strong Irish heritage throughout the US is evident in many activities and events across the country:



The Patriot is a movie chronicling the history of Francis Marion, known as "The Swamp Fox," who fought the British during the Revolutionary War in South Carolina. There were a significant amount of Irish people in the Charleston, South Carolina area pre-dating the Revolutionary War.

Ancient Order of the Hibernians



The Ancient Order of Hibernians (AOH) is America's oldest Irish Catholic Fraternal Organization founded in May, 1836.

The AOH building in Charleston, SC was originally built in 1799 and still functions for major AOH events to this day.



Chicago River Dyed Green



On the morning of the Chicago St. Patrick's Day Parade, six members of the Local Plumbers Union go out on three boats and use flour sifters to pour a topsecret, eco-friendly, vegetablebased dye that turns the Chicago River green for a duration of about five hours.

Savannah's Greening of the Fountain



Every St. Patrick's Day, for the last 35 years, Savannah, Georgia's Forsyth Park fountain had been dyed green.

The event proved to be so popular, now all of Savannah's fountains are dyed green on St. Patrick's Day.





Tippgrary Hill, Syracuse, NY


In the early 1800s, Irish immigrants made up the majority of the labor force who installed the Erie Canal across upstate New York. So many of their families hailed from County Tipperary, Ireland, that when they settled in Syracuse, they named their settlement Tipperary Hill.

In 1925, when the first stoplight was installed, Irish pride was so strong, and vandalism of the light so frequent, officials decided to revamp the light in 1928 and placed the "Irish" green light at the top while moving the "British" red light to the bottom. It remains that way to this day.

IMOS 2007 Meeting, Charleston, South Carolina

The third night, a local group of teenage Irish Dancers thrilled us all. Their coach, who was also from South Carolina, had previously danced professionally with River Dance.


Donald M. Williams Shamrocks and Pluff Mud A Glimpse of the Irish in the Southern City of Charleston, South Carolina

Shamrocks and Pluff Mud

A local attorney, Donald M. Williams, who was a past President of the South Carolina Irish Historical Society, wrote a history of South Carolina's Irish Community Entitled "Shamrocks and Pluff Mud."

(Pluff mud is the silt around the barrier islands in which oysters are harvested.)

Sullivan's Island, South Carolina





More Irish Influence in the South:


Sullivan's Island was named for Captain
Florence O'Sullivan, who was stationed here as
a lookout in the late 17th century. He appears
in the earliest record of Irish immigration to the
Carolinas, mentioned as being taken on
"at Kingsayle (Kinsale) in Ireland."

The Stella Maris Catholic Church on Sullivan's Island is led by the Rev. Msgr. Lawrence B. McInerny, J.C.L. Pastor McInerny's family has been in South Carolina since 1850.

Sullivan's Island, South Carolina




A big draw on the island is the traditional Irish Pub, Dunleavy's. They proudly display the Irish flag on the front of their pub daily.

7th President of the United States (Term of Office 1829-1837)

Andrew Jackson was born in the colonial Carolinas to an Irish-Scotch family.



Henry Ford

American Industrialist and Business Magnate Founder of the Ford Motor Company


Henry Ford was born in 1863, on a farm in Greenfield Township, Michigan. His father, William Ford, was born in County Cork, Ireland.



John F. Kennedy

35th President of the United States (Term of Office 1961-1963)

JFK grew up in Brookline, Massachusetts, but his four grandparents were Irish Immigrants.



Grace Kelly

Princess Grace
Princess of Monaco

Grace Kelly was an American film actress in the 1950s who later married Prince Rainier and became the Princess of Monaco.

Her father, the famous John B. Kelly, Sr., was the child of Irish immigrants.



John B. Kelly, Sr.

Self-Made Multimillionaire, Politician, and Olympic Champion

John B. Kelly, Sr., father of Grace Kelly, was born in Philadelphia to Irish immigrants who emigrated in 1869 from County Mayo, Ireland.

He was the first rower to ever win three Olympic gold medals. He made his fortune in the bricklaying and construction industry.
